Placement In-Professional Service of Outgoing Students 2018-2019

Introduction

5. Obstetrics and Gynecology Units:



These students, having 0 demonstrated a strong aptitude for emergency care, gained valuable experience in managing acute cases, performing triage, and providing immediate medical interventions. 4. Pediatric Wards: 15% of the students were allocated to the Pediatric Wards. These students had shown a 0 keen interest in pediatric nursing, and their placement allowed them to work with children, providing care tailored to younger patients. 5. Obstetrics and Gynecology Wards: 17% of the students were placed in Obstetrics and Gynecology Wards. These placements were ideal for those specializing in maternal and child health, offering them the chance to assist in deliveries and provide comprehensive care to mothers and newborns. 6. Surgical Units: The remaining 8% of the students were placed in the Surgical Units, including 0 operation theaters (OTs). These placements provided critical exposure to preoperative and postoperative care, as well as hands-on experience in assisting during surgeries.
